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## **Banning Donations from Private Prison Companies**

- 2 WHEREAS the private prison industry in the United States is a multi-billion dollar industry
- 3 involving approximately 400 companies, 71 of which currently house and supervise immigrant
- 4 children; and
- 5 WHEREAS private prison corporations enter into contracts with municipalities and the federal
- 6 government with guarantees that they will receive a minimum "supply" of human prisoners;
- 7 and

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- 8 WHEREAS governmental "must-supply" contracts with private prisons lead to excessive levels
- 9 of incarceration for non-violent, low-level crimes, unjustly impacting and systematically
- 10 decimating communities of color; and
- 11 WHEREAS for-profit prisons are not subject to the same oversight that government-run jails
- 12 and prisons are, and meet profit goals through negligence towards prisoners and maintaining
- 13 substandard living conditions; and
- 14 WHEREAS the industry spent \$1.6 million lobbying, donating to candidates, and funding
- 15 super-PACs in 2016, mostly to Republicans, and is on track to spend over a million in 2018; and
- 16 WHEREAS the Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agency alone spends more than
- 17 \$2 billion a year on immigrant detention through private jails, and nearly half of the \$3.4 billion
- 18 paid to these companies in the last four years went to homes with serious allegations of child
- 19 mistreatment<sup>1</sup>; and
- 20 WHEREAS large private prison firms, reorganized as real estate trusts, have received
- 21 preferential tax windfalls from the 2017 Republican tax bill<sup>2</sup>; and
- 22 WHEREAS the above conditions create perverse incentives for driving increased unjust
- 23 incarceration and exploitation of low-level non-violent offenders, and individuals without
- 24 immigration or citizenship papers, with adverse effects on their families; and
- 25 **WHEREAS** the interests of private prisons are, in part, driving opposition to common-sense
- 26 drug law reforms; and

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- 29 WHEREAS the Obama administration in 2016 announced it was ending incarceration of federal
- 30 prisoners in private facilities (but not immigration detainees)<sup>3</sup>, and both 2016

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31 Democratic candidates Bernie Sanders and Hillary Clinton have called for an end to private 32 prison incarceration<sup>4</sup>; 33 **WHEREAS** as of 2017, three states had banned private prisons – New York, Illinois, and Iowa; 34 and 35 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Washington State Democrats call for the abolition of 36 private, for-profit incarceration in Washington State and in the United States; and 37 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Washington State Democratic legislative delegation 38 support HR 3844, calling for phasing out existing contracts of the U.S. Department of Justice 39 with private prison companies; and 40 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Washington State Democratic legislative delegation 41 support HR 3923, calling for the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to establish detention 42 standards and to phase out the use of private detention facilities for aliens in DHS custody; and 43 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Washington State Democrats will not accept donations 44 from companies in the for-profit prison industry; and 45 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Washington State Democrats call upon the DNC, DCCC, 46 DSCC, and other Democratic-aligned organizations to reject donations from the for-profit 47 prison industry; and 48 **BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED** that the Washington State Democrats will provide a copy of this 49 resolution to the DNC, DCCC, DSCC, Democratic legislators, and Democratic candidates within 50 Washington state. 51 52 53 Submitted by the Benton County Democratic Platform Committee to the Benton County 54 Democratic Central Committee (Date Submitted 8/05/2018) 55 56 Adopted by the Benton County Democratic Central Committee and by the 8th LDDO 57 August 15, 2018. 58 59 To be submitted to the Washington State Democratic Central Committee September 2, 60 2018.
